2018 North Star Classic Livestock Honoree



Ron Zimprich was honored last December during the North Star Classic.

I was born and raised on a diversified farm near Cooperstown, ND. My parents were Bernard and Gen Zimprich; and I have four brothers Dave, Russ, Don and Neil and 2 sisters Shirley Hanson and Evy Ressler.

My wife Cheryl and I have 3 grown children; Brian, Kari Thurlow and Craig along with 4 grandchildren.

Growing up, I was active in 4-H; I judged both livestock and crops at the North Dakota Winter Show receiving 3rd place at the State Crops judging contest.

I graduated from Cooperstown High School in 1965 and enrolled at NDSU in Animal Science. After graduating with a BS degree in Animal Science, I went on to graduate school; and in 1971 accepted the Swine Herdsman position at NDSU.

For nearly 45 years as herdsman, I had the opportunity to show NDSU hogs at numerous livestock shows including the North Dakota Winter Show. I also brought hog judging classes around the state and acted as official for 4-H and FFA contests including many of the State contests at the NDWS.

At NDSU, I taught swine production lab and was advisor to the Saddle and Sirloin club for 24 years. During my time at NDSU, the Swine barn supplied hogs for the Little I showmanship contest and the Judging contest put on during Little I.

In 2016, I was honored by the S&S club as their 90th Agriculturist of the Year.

Besides managing the NDSU Swine unit, I was superintendent of the Red River Valley Fair Swine and Sheep show, Leader of the Prosper Livestock 4-H Club, a member of the North Dakota Pork Producers and served on the North Dakota Pork Producers Board for 20 years. I have served on the NDWS Livestock committee; and am a member of the Holy Spirit Church and the Knights of Columbus.

I retired from NDSU in 2016 and now live in North Fargo. I keep active in the community and watch my sons and grandkids carrying on raising and showing hogs.

Inductees Selected for the 2019 ND Agriculture Hall of Fame

The North Dakota Agriculture Hall of Fame Committee has selected the nominees that will be inducted into the North Dakota Agriculture Hall of Fame in 2019. The nominees are Robert Carlson of Jamestown and Dr. Marcia McMullen of Fargo.



As a farmer, former president of North Dakota Farmers Union, and the first president of the World Farmers Organization based in Rome, Robert Carlson has worked tirelessly to improve the economic conditions of farmers and rural citizens everywhere through innovative initiatives.

He pioneered the Carbon Credit Program to put millions of dollars into the pockets of farmers in exchange for sequestering carbon in their soil to limit greenhouse gas emissions; helped establish Dakota

Pride Cooperative, which markets identity-preserved crops globally; and launched a farmer-owned restaurant in Washington, D.C. – now a chain of Founding Farmer restaurants – for farmers to earn a greater share of the consumer's food dollar.

Carlson was instrumental in passing the first-ever disaster assistance program for U.S. livestock producers in 1997, after blizzards and flooding claimed the lives of 110,000 head of cattle in our region. He also spearheaded the Rally for Rural America in 2000, the largest gathering of farmers ever in our nation's capital (more than 4,000),

to draw attention to the economic crisis gripping farm and rural economies.

As a global thinker, Robert implemented a number of humanitarian efforts beyond North Dakota's borders, including on-the-ground rebuilding in rural Mississippi after Hurricane Katrina, and delivery of North Dakota wheat to starving widows and children in Afghanistan.

Carlson served as the United Nations Special Ambassador of the International Year of Family Farming in 2014, and also was appointed to USDA's Agricultural Trade Advisory Committee for Grains and Oilseeds.

He grew up on a family farm near Glenburn and served in the Vietnam War. He holds advanced degrees from Minot State University and the University of North Dakota. As a history enthusiast, he coauthored several works, including *The Legacy of North Dakota's Country Schools*. He and his wife raised two sons on the Carlson farm, along with small grains and bison.

In his spare time, Carlson enjoys reading, biking, hiking, and repairing things. He has always believed that farming is the most important job in the world.



Dr. Marcia McMullen is a retired NDSU Professor and Extension Plant Pathologist / IPM Coordinator. She earned her doctorate degree in plant pathology at NDSU. Dr. McMullen was a faculty member of the Plant Pathology Department at NDSU for nearly 30 years.

During her career at NDSU, Dr. McMullen's research and the information she provided on disease management in wheat and

barley was instrumental to the success of farmers in North Dakota and throughout the region. Dr. McMullen was involved in numerous professional state, regional, and national organizations; including being a member of the Northcentral IPM Stakeholder Committee, the Executive Committee of the US Wheat and Barley Scab Initiative, the Northcentral Wheat Pathologist's Committee, the Advanced Crop Advisors Committee, and the Policy Committee of Northland Federal Educator's Credit Union. Additionally, she was the Chair of the Promotion, Tenure, and Evaluation Committee for the NDSU College of Agriculture.

Service Award from Upsilon Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Phi Extension Fraternity, the Boss of the Year Award from the International Association of Administrative Professionals, the Excellence in Extension Award from the American Phytopathological Society, the Distinguished Service Award from the Northcentral Division of the American Phytopathological Society, the Agricultural Woman of the Year award from the Sigma Alpha Agriculture Sorority, the Honorary Kernel Award from the ND Grain Growers Association, the Woman of the Year in Agriculture award from the Fargo/Moorhead YWCA, and the Communicator of the Year Award from the NDSU Agricultural Communication Association. Lastly, she was the first female faculty member that was promoted to the level of Professor in the College of Agriculture at NDSU.

She has authored or co-authored 10 Book Chapters and Reviews, 25 publications in Refereed Journals, and numerous Extension Publications and Surveys. Dr. McMullen continues to be engaged in agriculture by editing journal manuscripts for researchers that are attempting to publish their research. In her spare time, she likes to garden, read, travel, and spend time with her family. Dr. McMullen resides in Fargo, she is married, has four grown children, one grandson, and one granddaughter.

Keep The Soil Alive!

Sometimes people use the word "dirt" to describe a piece of ground, and then "dirty" becomes a bad thing, messing up floors and clothes. Healthy SOIL is a great resource, and is home to a huge web of life: some of the biggest players in a soil "eco-system" are microscopically tiny!

Soil has its own wildlife: there are beetles, amoeba, bacteria, moles, worms, and fungi living in the soil side by side. Each of these has many cousins: so many that more are being discovered and named each year. Space and food for each of these is important to them and very valuable to us.

Keeping the soil alive is a function of the soil eco-system. It is also a major goal of all farmers. A healthy soil encourages plant development, supports better quality crops, increases the overall production of crops in the field, and provides great fruits, vegetables and grains for each of us.

Mutton Busting during Ranch & PRCA Rodeos

The North Dakota Winter Show gets kids involved by inviting them to participate in the "Mutton Busting" held during the NDWS Ranch Rodeo and PRCA rodeos. The Ranch Rodeo is scheduled for Thursday, March 7th at 6:30pm. The PRCA Rodeo performances are scheduled for 2pm and 7pm on Saturday, March 9th, and 2pm on Sunday, March 10th.

What is it? Mutton busting is an event held at rodeos, similar to bull riding or bronc riding, in which children ride sheep. After the participant climbs aboard, the sheep is released into the arena where the rider has six seconds to try and hang on.

How do I enter? To enter the mutton busting, kids must be ages 4-7 and weigh 55 pounds or less. No entry fee is required, but tickets must be purchased for the respective rodeo performance. Protective gear will be provided and entry forms are available online, at

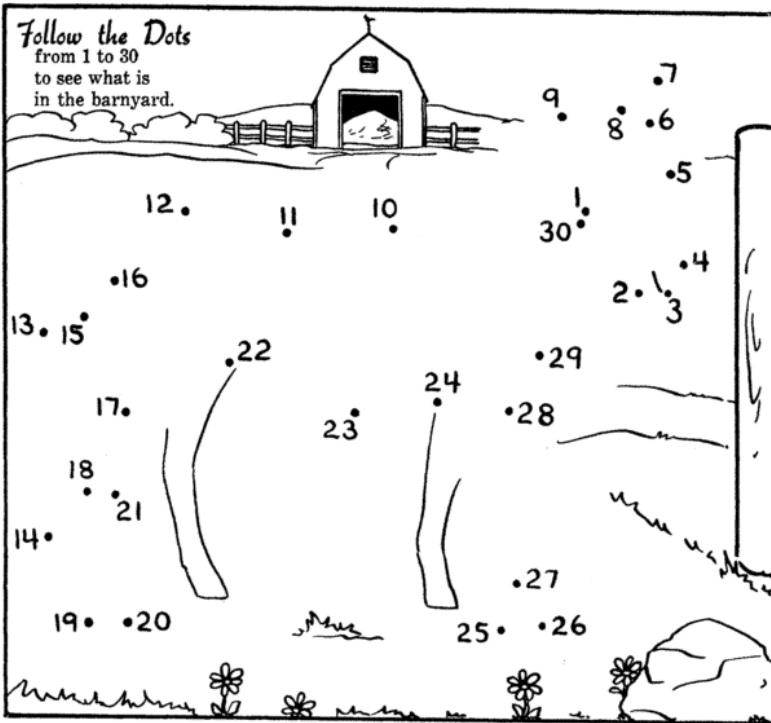

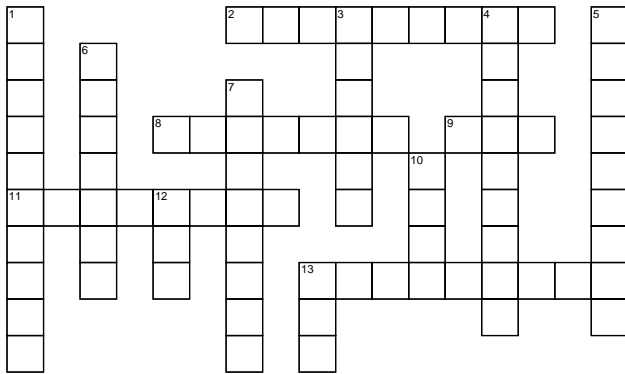

2019 ND State Crop Show Honoree

2019 ND State Crop Show Honoree – Allen Giese



Our 2019 North Dakota State Crop Show honoree is Allen Giese. He was born in 1959 in Appleton, MN where he grew up on a diversified crop and livestock farm; with crops like wheat, soybeans, corn, sunflowers, and alfalfa. Allen attended Appleton High School and received his diploma in 1978. From 1974 to 1978, he was involved in the FFA Chapter; being a chapter officer for two of those years. He then went on to attend North Dakota State University receiving his Bachelor of Science Degree in Agriculture Education in 1982 along with his Master's Degree in Education in 1989; where he was a member of the Alpha Gamma Rho Fraternity. This fraternity is a social and professional organization for men pursuing degrees in agriculture, food, fiber, life sciences, natural resources, forestry or environmental fields. During his time at NDSU, he was also involved with the North Dakota State Collegiate FFA from 1978 to 1982.

Allen taught at the Wahpeton High School and the Southeast Region Career and Technology Center in Wahpeton, ND for 31 years as an Agriculture Education Instructor from 1982 to 2014. Over 300 students achieved their State FFA Degree and over 70 students achieved their American FFA Degree under his guidance. Not to mention, over 30 students earned the prestigious award of State Star Finalist in the ND FFA and 1 student being Star Farmer of America Finalist. In 1992, he decided to continue his education at University of Grand Forks with 14 graduate semester hours in Computer, Applied Math, GESA, School-to-Work, and Professional Development classes. From there he kept

busy earning another 32 graduate semester hours at NDSU in Field Problems, Professional Development, Program Development and Evaluation, SAE-Adult Programs, and FFA Contest Development classes.

Allen has many experiences that he was awarded for, such as being involved in the ND Winter Show Sweepstake Award with the Wahpeton FFA Chapter winning from 1997 to 2006. From 1997 to 1999, he conducted a Russian Student Exchange Program for 2 years where students went on a 30-day Agricultural mission trip through the Rural Enterprise Adaption Program. In 2002, through his affiliation with the North Dakota Association of Agriculture Educators (NDAAE), the Wahpeton Agricultural Education department received "Program of the Year" and the Wahpeton FFA was recognized as a Model of Innovation Chapter in Community Development receiving second in the nation. He was awarded the Agri-Science Teacher of the Year in 1993, Outstanding Secondary Agriculture Teacher in 1998, and the NDACTE Teacher of the Year in 1999. He doesn't stop there though, in 2003, he received the Honorary American FFA Degree along with Outstanding Program for the NDAAE and the Outstanding Secondary Program in 2005. He was also honored as a top educator with his inspired excellence and impressive achievements with the Milken Educator Award in 2004.

Allen is a founding member of the Wahpeton FFA Alumni as well as a former member of the NDSCS Agriculture Advisory Council. From 1995 to 1999 and 2000 to 2007, he served on the Board of Directors for the ND FFA Foundation. Allen also served as President for the NDAAE from 2000 to 2001. He was a huge part of his community, serving as a Director for the Bagg Bonanza Farm Historical Preservation Society and as Director for the Red River Sportsman Club from 1990- 1993 in which he is now a lifetime member. He was awarded "Sportsman of the Year" in 1992. Allen is still active as an Instructor for Hunter Education, and has been since 1985. He has judged many places, including the Wilkin County Fair, the Red River Valley Fair, and for 4-H Achievement Days. He also used his time towards a mentoring program in Richland County, mentoring youth who may be at risk or have a single parent.

Allen has helped the North Dakota Winter Show State Crop Show tremendously. He was the ND FFA Crop Show Superintendent for over 10 years. During that time, he was in charge of receiving the crop samples for entry and preparing them for judging. Allen coordinated the judging and ribboning of these samples, along with organizing the display in the arena. After judging was done, he led a group to tabulate these results and turn them into the Crop Show office. Allen was a strong ambassador and advocate to ND teachers and students to encourage them to exhibit crop samples at the ND State Crop Show. He also promoted the ND Crop Show to new FFA Chapters encouraging them to participate as well.

Allen retired from teaching Agriculture Education in 2014, but still keeps busy with his many hobbies. Some of them include hunting, fishing, gardening and volunteering for various programs in his community and around the area. Currently Allen resides in Wahpeton with his wife Patricia.
