

North Dakota State Crop Show Exhibitor Guide

The 2023 North Dakota State Crop Show is on March 3rd, 2023 at the North Dakota Winter Show in Valley City

General Rules and Regulations for Exhibitors

- 1. Any resident of North Dakota may exhibit a crop sample grown in North Dakota from either the 2021 or 2022 growing season.
- 2. An exhibitor can only enter in <u>one division</u>, either the open, 4-H or FFA division. No person shall be permitted to enter more than one exhibit of the same variety in any one lot.
- 3. Exhibitors must state on the entry tag the class, lot number and the kind and variety under which the entry is to be judged. The officials in charge of exhibits, or the judges, reserve the right to make any corrections in class or lot numbers in case of errors.
- 4. Open division, FFA division and 4-H division entries should use their respective official entry tag.
 - Active FFA members, either in or out of school are eligible to exhibit.
 - FFA division entry tag should include the FFA member's address and phone number, name and address of exhibitor's FFA Chapter and have entry tag signed by the instructor.
 - FFA division entry tags can be found on the North Dakota FFA website at: www.ndffa. org/state-crop-show
 - 4-H entry tags should include the exhibitor name, phone number, address and county of the exhibitor and have the entry tag signed by the Extension Agent.
 - 4-H division entry tags can be obtained by contacting your local Extension Agent.
 - All samples and sheaves become the property of the North Dakota State Crop Show Committee and will not be returned. Extension Agents or FFA Advisors can request samples for educational purposes by completing a request form available from the Winter Show office. The sample request form is due at registration. Samples need to be picked up Monday following the conclusion of the Winter Show during office hours.
- 5. Entries will not be accepted after 10 AM, Friday, March 3rd, and judging of all classes will begin at 1 PM on that date.
 - 4-H/FFA Members: if you wish to deliver your crop samples to one of the following locations they will be transported to Valley City by the entry deadline.

 - Beulah High School, 204 5th St. NW, Beulah, **By noon on Saturday, February 25th, 2023**
 - ND FFA State Office, 600 E Boulevard Ave, Dept 270 ~ 15th Floor, Bismarck, **By noon on Thursday, March 2nd, 2023**
 - Carrington Public School, 100 3rd Ave South, Carrington, **By 6:00 pm on Thursday,** March 2nd, 2023
 - North Dakota Winter Show, 700 7th St SE, Valley City, by 10 AM on Friday, March 3rd, 2023 (entry deadline)
- 6. The North Dakota State Crop Show management will not be responsible for loss, damage, or mixture of any entry, but will exercise reasonable precaution at all times.
- 7. All samples must be properly labeled inside. Entry blanks should accompany all samples and must be signed. Include **variety name and company name**.

- 8. The following minimum quantities will be required for all entries in the open, 4-H and FFA Divisions:
 - •Two quarts ~ Wheat, durum, oat, barley, sunflower, rye, pea, lentil, bean and shelled corn
 - One quart ~ Flax, canola, grasses, small seeded legumes, millet, and seeds of similar size
 - Corn ~ Ten ears
- 9. Small grain sheaves should measure 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 inches in diameter halfway between the butt and the head of the sheave. Sheaves should be tied firmly and securely in three to four places.
- 10. Entries not meeting the minimum requirements will be disqualified.
- 11. The management reserves the right, and the judges are authorized to reject any exhibits which in their opinion are deemed to be undesirable or not properly exhibited or represented. Commercially prepared seed, treated seed, unclean or bin run seed will be disqualified.
- 12. All exhibit entries will be judged by the group placing system. The best blue-ribbon entries from the three divisions in each lot will compete for Championship premium money and awards. Merit ribbons will be awarded to those samples in each lot which pass high show standards but which do not receive premium money in the Championship.
 - Premium money for FFA and 4-H divisions will be: Blue \$5; Red \$3; White \$1
 - A \$10 premium will be awarded to the 1st place blue ribbon exhibit in the 4-H, FFA and Open division per lot.
 - \bullet Championship premiums will be awarded to the top 4 to 6 exhibits among all divisions based on sponsorships:

Crop Show Honoree

The 2023 North Dakota State Crop Show is dedicated to Joel Ransom, retired NDSU Extension Agronomist. Joel retired from NDSU Extension in February 2021 after 18 years. He was on the State Crop Show committee and manager throughout his career at NDSU. He organized and recruited judges for the State Crop Show.

Joel was born and raised in Idaho and earned his bachelor's degree in agronomy from Brigham Young University. He earned his master's and doctoral degrees, also in agronomy, from the University of Minnesota, along with a plant physiology minor on his Ph.D.




Prior to joining NDSU, Ransom worked for 20 years as a wheat and maize agronomist for the International Maize and Wheat Improvement Center (CIMMYT). He started out stationed in Mexico, later worked in East Africa based in Nairobi, Kenya, and eventually was stationed in Nepal.

Joel was honored on several occasions for his work and service. In 2017, he was presented the George Washington Award by the NDSU Agriculture Collective in conjunction with NDSU Ag Week festivities. The student-selected award recognized his knowledge, hard work and determination to contribute to the agriculture community and industry. Joel was awarded the U.S. President's Council on Service and Civic Participation Volunteer Service Award in 2017 for his work in Senegal, Africa, where he provided more than 100 hours of service with Winrock International's USAID funded Farmer-to-Farmer program. In 2018, he was chosen by the U.S. Durum Growers Association as the recipient of the Amber Award for his significant contributions to durum growers and the industry.

Joel and his wife Patty live in Bismarck to fulfill an assignment to preside over the Bismarck, North Dakota, Temple of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. They oversee and train about 200 volunteers that serve the Church members who visit the Temple from North and South Dakota, parts of Montana, and Minnesota.




